On one level, the year 2022 meant a return to a normal state of affairs following the “COVID years”, in the sense that essentially all seminars and conferences were held in person, the four Research Teams could meet in person rather than virtually, and IAST researchers could fully resume their data collection endeavors in the field and in the lab. We also had the great pleasure of organizing for the first time an event that pulled together three parts of the global IAST community: local researchers, members of the Scientific Council, and former Research Fellows. This Friends of IAST Conference gave a snapshot of the incredible wealth of research questions and methods represented in this community, as well as of the openness with which its members approach it.

On another level, the year 2022 turned out to engage the community to which IAST belongs on a completely new and very exciting path: following months of intense discussions, both internally at Toulouse School of Economics (TSE) and Université Toulouse 1 Capitole, and with other institutions in Toulouse, on December 8th 2022 the Ministry of Higher Education, Research, and Innovation finalized the decision to transform this community into the Toulouse School of Economics and Quantitative Social Sciences. As of January 1st 2023 TSE + IAST and the École d'Économie de Toulouse thus together form the “Grand Établissement TSE”, a legally independent Public Research and Teaching Institution.

This status change was accompanied by some modifications in the internal structure, in particular the creation on January 1st 2023 of the Department of

Social and Behavioral Sciences, which from now on is the academic home of the permanent faculty in the IAST community – economists and non-economists alike. This Department will be IAST's sister within TSE: its mission will also be to promote inter-disciplinary research, and it will work in close collaboration with IAST to continue to attract highly accomplished Research Fellows and Visitors to IAST, and to organize top-notch multi-disciplinary scientific conferences. Thanks to these game-changing events in 2022, the community surrounding IAST is expected to grow substantially over the next few years. Indeed, the Grand Établissement TSE has a clear ambition: in a few years' time TSE should not only be a top Economics Department in the world, but also recognized as a center of excellent research and teaching in Quantitative Social Sciences. Stay tuned!

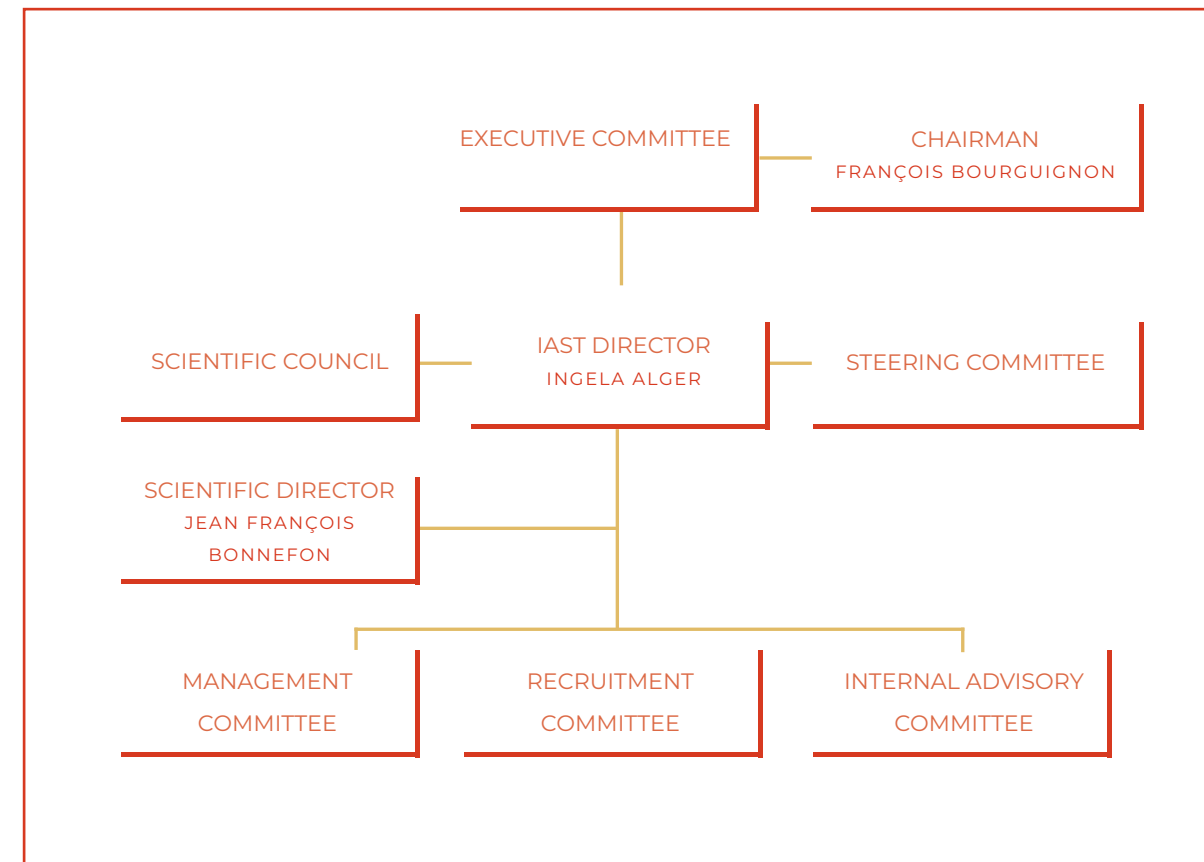
Toulouse is a unified scientific project whose broad aim is to study human behavior through an innovative and multidisciplinary approach to social science. Our Institute is home to a team of resident full-time researchers from leading universities worldwide. While most researchers preferentially use analytical and quantitative methods to address their scientific questions, some researchers combine qualitative and quantitative methods, while others rely on qualitative methods. The Institute welcomes a large network of visitors from >25 countries, and partners with economists and mathematicians at the Toulouse Capitole University, INRAE, CNRS and the Toulouse School of Economics.

IAST GOVERNANCE

IAST operates as a sheltered foundation under the aegis of the Jean-Jacques Laffont - TSE Foundation. IAST has a Scientific Council composed of 28 members and is governed by an Executive Committee (COMEX) with representatives of the Toulouse Capitole University, the Jean-Jacques Laffont - TSE Foundation including a representative of IAST researchers, the collegium of public partners, and the collegium of economic partners. In 2022 the Director of IAST is Ingela Alger, and its Scientific Director is Jean-François Bonnefon.

François Bourguignon (Director of research emeritus at EHESS, former Chief Economist & Senior Vice President of the World Bank in Washington and former Director of Paris School of Economics) is the chairman of the IAST Executive Committee, helping develop IAST alongside its mother institution, the internationally renowned Toulouse School of Economics (TSE).

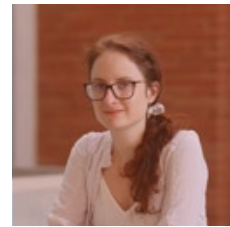


VISITORS TO IAST

In 2022, IAST welcomed 19 visitors, excluding speakers at seminars, workshops and conferences. Seven of them stayed for more than 6 months.

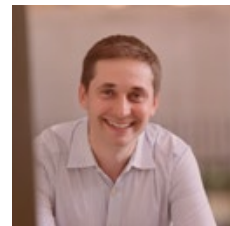
IAST RESEARCH FELLOWS

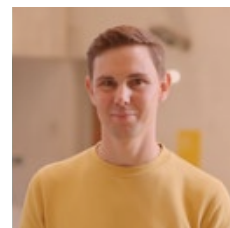
Anne DEGRAVE

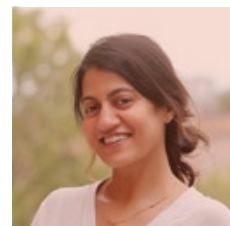
Michael DENLY

Felix's research focuses on democratic backsliding and autocratic politics using game theory and causal inference from observational data.



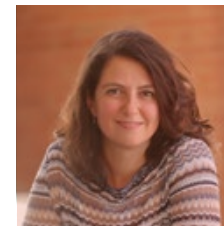

RESEARCH TEAM

SOCIAL EVOLUTION

Explaining the evolution of cooperation is a fundamental goal of the evolutionary human sciences. The Social Evolution team aims to provide a natural forum for discussion and collaboration on topics related to the (genetic or cultural) evolution of social behaviors in general, and of large-scale human cooperation in particular. Our research team is currently pursuing two lines of research. The first aims to re-evaluate the theoretical foundations

of the cultural evolution of human cooperation, focusing on identifying the limits of and finding alternatives to current mathematical models of cultural group selection. The second aims to study the bottom-up emergence and maintenance of institutions regulating collective action and cooperative behavior in human groups. Our research takes an interdisciplinary approach, bridging insights from evolutionary biology, economics, anthropology, and psychology while drawing on a variety of methodologies, including theoretical models, experiments, and ethnographic research.

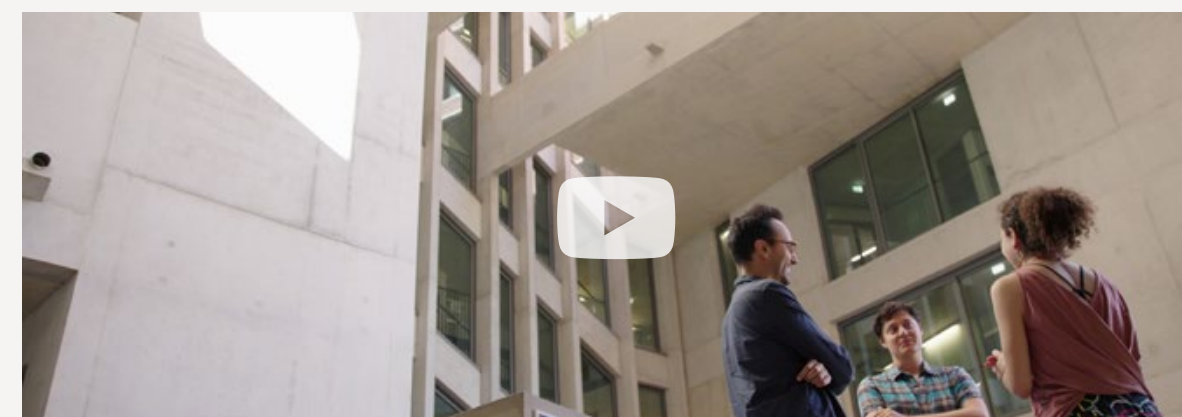

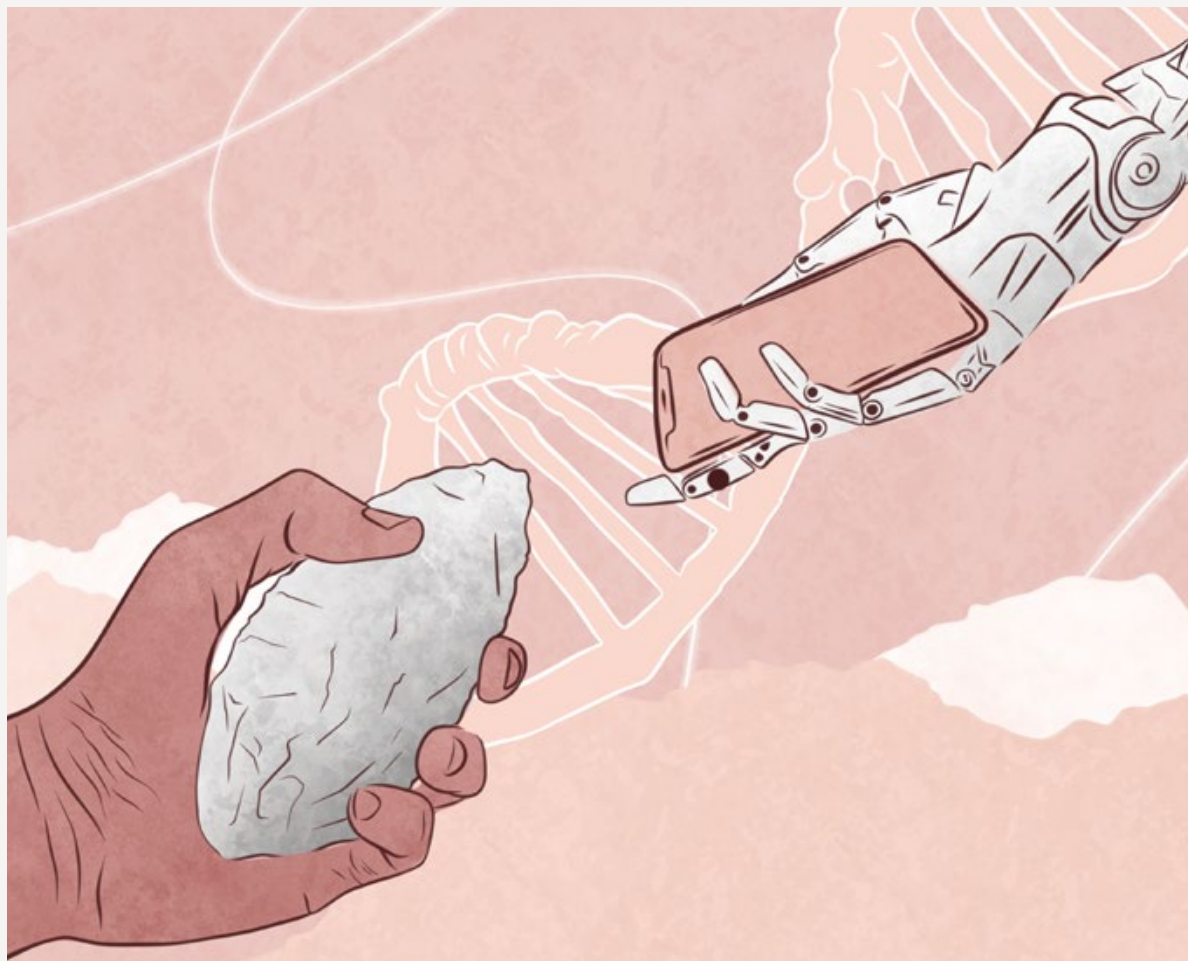

EVOLUTION OF TECHNOLOGY

The IAST Research Team on the Evolution of Technology aims to encourage collaboration on topics related to the evolution of technology, broadly defined as those techniques, skills, methods, and processes used in the production of products or services or in the accomplishment of objectives. The team seeks to improve our understanding of the evolution of technology over short, long, and very long-time scales and its implications for human biological and cultural

evolution. It addresses questions such as: which sets of biological traits and social structures allow humans to develop increasingly complex technologies? Which environmental and social conditions are especially conducive to the evolution of technology? How has technology affected our biology, and the way we think? How does it affect our use of time, space, and natural resources? Our interdisciplinary research leverages collaborations between biologists, economists, psychologists and anthropologists and incorporates a variety of methods, such as mathematical models, experiments and ethnographic studies.

FRIENDS OF IAST CONFERENCE

While IAST encompasses a large community in Toulouse itself, the overall IAST community is much larger.

In particular, the 55 former Research Fellows as well as the 38 members of the Executive Committee and the Scientific Council are naturally part of this community: the former because they often continue to maintain links with each other, inter alia thanks to collaborations started during their years in Toulouse, and the latter because they take an active interest in the evolution of IAST.

After two years of reduced frequency of in-person activities due to the covid-19 situation, the year 2022 saw the first event meant to bring together these three parts of the IAST community: the current researchers, the alumni, and the members of the Executive Committee and the Scientific Council. This Friends of IAST Conference gathered about 80 members of this global IAST community in Toulouse on June 27 and 28.

In accordance with one of the main objectives of this conference, the 27 scientific presentations showed the impressive variety of themes and research methods represented in this community. From risk sensitivity in decision making in rats, to the role of deliberation in reducing belief in conspiracy theories, learning

among hunter-gatherers, and the links between globalization and democracy, the researchers present were immersed or re-immersed in the intellectual melting pot that is the IAST.

The conference attendees also engaged in two other kinds of exchanges. First, a round-table on the theme «How to fail at interdisciplinary research» allowed four experienced researchers to generously share anecdotes about interdisciplinary collaborations that could have worked better, or misunderstandings that could have been avoided. Second, the conference ended with an afternoon of unconstrained brainstorming – rapid prototyping - which gave rise to research project ideas that were not always realistic, but always inspired and inspiring.



SUMMER SCHOOL IN QUANTITATIVE SOCIAL SCIENCES

The 2nd edition of the Toulouse Summer School in Quantitative Social Sciences (1st edition in person) was held over four weeks from May 30th to June 24th, 2022. It was organized by Jorge Peña (IAST) and Victor Gay (TSE, IAST), with administrative assistance by Céline Lemesle (UT1).

The Summer School was divided into two parts. Each part awarded students 3 ECTS credits upon completion. The content program was as follows:

- Part 1 (May 30-June 10): The evolution of human sociality. This part covered the topics of human social evolution and mathematical models of social evolution. Course instructors were Jonathan Stieglitz (IAST), Jorge Peña (IAST), and Peter Bayer (IAST). During that part, students had the opportunity to attend the 9th Toulouse Economics and Biology workshop.

- Part 2 (June 13-June 24): Economics and political institutions. This part covered

the topics of institutions and economic development, intergenerational mobility, democracy and inequality, and social medial and politics. Course instructors were Horacio Larreguy (ITAM), Mohamed Saleh (IAST), and Victor Gay (IAST). During that part, students had the opportunity to present their research during the Political Economic workshop.

The Summer School hosted 18 graduate students (among which 7 female students) during Part 1 from a wide variety of fields (from psychology to biology, anthropology, and political economy) and a large set of institutions (Max Planck, Leiden, Harvard, UCL, Oxford, UCM, Kent, Helsinki, ENS). There were also 18 graduate students during Part 2 (among which 7 female students) mostly from the fields of economics and political science, and from a large set of institutions (Princeton, EUI, UCM, UCL, Yale, Lund, LSE, Harvard, UCSD, Bologna, UAB, Groningen...).

All students had access to university

housing (CROUS). Students in fields outside economics had their transportation costs funded (up to 500 euros in Europe, 1,000 euros elsewhere) as well as their program fees (275 euros) waived. Students in the field of economics had to fund their travels and pay the program fees.

We had a few technical issues in having students access the Moodle space initially due to technical issues on the UT1 side. For the next edition, we have advanced the application deadline by one month to avoid any delay. We also had trouble finding study spaces for students. This issue has been sorted for the next edition.

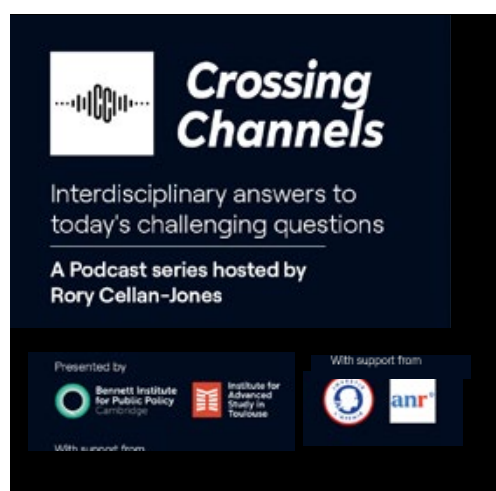
This first in-person edition was a success. The Summer School can also be thought of as a means to introduce IAST to potential future Research Fellows—for instance, Olympia Campbell (UCL) who was present during the whole Summer School, will be a IAST Research Fellow starting in September 2023.

Students also reported to have greatly benefitted from interacting with peers from heterogeneous institutional origins and research fields. They also very much enjoyed the quality of the teaching and of the infrastructures, as well as the environment of center-Toulouse



SUMMER SCHOOL

CROSSING CHANNELS PODCAST SERIES



In 2022, the Bennett Institute for Public Policy at Cambridge University and the Institute for Advanced Study in Toulouse pursued their work in popularizing social sciences with a new chapter of podcasts.

In each episode, researchers from both sides of the Channel, and from widely differing disciplinary backgrounds, discuss various approaches to explore complex challenges and offer policy solutions.
